

Falmouth's **Green Corridor**

Follow the Bickland Stream as it waves its way through Falmouth. Explore the magnificant woodlands and wildlife paths before ending at the sea at Swanpool.



Easy terrain

Mushrooms

Woodlands can be the ideal place for mushrooms to thrive. They help trees thrive by connecting the roots, creating the 'wood wide web'. This mushroom species is an oyster mushroom. They can live all-year round and love the deciduous and beech-filled woodlands.

Animals

Grey Squirrels are now a very common woodland animal. From being introduced in 1870s, they have thrived in our woodlands. They love running up and down trees, as well as on the ground. Maybe if you are quiet, you will get to see one!



Insects

Insects are so vital for the woodland. They are food for the birds, as well as help plants pollinate. Other insects just rest within the woodland, such as this Eurasian Hornet. This hornet may seem scary, but it just wanted to rest! It is also better to watch the insects as it can be very interesting.



Plants and flowering plants are what make up the habitat of a woodland. However, when and where they flower can be different. The narcissus daffodils start blooming typically in early spring. These can be some of the first flowers that bloom, bringing back some colour to the woodland.



Tregoniggie Titan

This tree is called the Tregoniggie Titan. Featured within Tregoniggie Woods, this ash tree is a few hundreds years old! If you explore further, some of the base has been hollowed out. whilst new trees have emerged out of it.



Falmouth's Green Corridor



This is Falmouth's Green Corridor, following the Bickland Stream from its source, from Falmouth Football Club to the sea.

Route; around 3km Time to walk; up to an hour Terrain; easy, accessible path Dogs welcome

1. Totem Poles

The Totem Poles in Tregoniggie Woods has become quite well-known. These half-felled beech trees now have a second life. Try and find the octopus in the carvings!

2. The Bickland Stream

This is the stream that the whole Green Corridor follows. Twisting and weaving along the landscape, the stream provides homes for a multitude of animals and plants.

3. Prislow Woods's Boardwalk

This boardwalk allows us to experience life through this woodland-wetland. The reeds that grow here allow other wildlife to thrive, such as grey wagtails or small insects.

4. Swanvale Nature Reserve

This nature reserve is run by Cornwall Wildlife Trust and is a link between the sea and the fresh water from the Bickland Stream.
