He reported that Falmouth had been successful in the GB British High Street Coastal Community Award and this was noted by the Council with pleasure.

RESOLVED unanimously that the Council acquires the bugle as recommended by the Royal Marine Bandmaster at £350 plus VAT and £50 engraving, to present to Bill Bishop in recognition of his attendance and performances at Community Remembrance events.

Boslowick

Councillor Jewell updated the Council regarding the Ocean Bowl site and Middlepoint planning application refusals. Also he felt that Cormac were not providing a reactive service to leaf fall removal nor ditch and highway maintenance and he would raise that at the Community Network meeting.

Trescobeas

Councillor Saunby updated regarding the Maritime Line Forum and service and station works. The dimensions of new rolling stock meant that a third carriage would be added to the service. There were also major works planned for the main line with bus services from Truro to Penzance during January and February 2017. He also reported upon a very successful litter pick by the Trescobeas Residents Association.

Councillor Ms Atherton advised she had been re-elected to the National Association of Local Councils Super Councils Network and chaired workshops at the National Conference. She had also been appointed to the Sustainability and Transformation Scrutiny Committee at Cornwall Council. The traffic bollard in Church Street/Market Street had failed again and Cornwall Council were looking at the sustainability of this measure and aspirations around pedestrianisation. A local donor had ensured the School Crossing Service for King Charles School could continue for another three years. She had utilised her Community Chest funds for additional highway railings to assist the crossing.

Councillor Evans reported further on rail station access improvement works. Traffic Regulation Works were still outstanding and he felt that was unacceptable.

C4795 COUNCIL BUDGET AND PRECEPT CALL

The Chair of the Committee advised that the budget provided a good scale of service, with some prudent growth. There had been no negative reaction from the public at all nor further Councillor input. The Town Clerk when questioned confirmed that there had been no negative reaction.

RESOLVED that the Council's budget for 2017/18 be approved and that a precept call of £1,695,574.96 (an increase of £4.75 per annum on a Band D property over the 2016/17 level) be made to Cornwall Council.

C4797 TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

The Town Clerk presented his report that was duly noted and forms part of these minutes. He also reported an updated in regard to CCTV operation which was duly noted. Further:

(1) OFF STREET PARKING ORDER (2017)

It was proposed by Councillor Saunby, seconded by Councillor Mrs Minson and

RESOLVED that the Council makes the following response to the Cornwall Council Off Street Parking Order (2017) Consultation:

As regards the increase to the overnight charge to £2, the Council are strongly opposed to this, and support the representations already made by the Town Mayor, in conjunction with the Mayors of Truro and Newquay.

Anecdotally the Council are acutely aware that charges are becoming a bar to residents and visitors coming to our town centre and beaches. The Council therefore again strongly opposes any increases to car parking charges.

There should be a joined up solution by Cornwall Council. The recent On-Street and Residents Parking proposals if implemented will adversely impact upon workers in the town who will need cheaper long-stay car parking in the town. As will users of our beaches and parks and gardens. The Council supports the representations made by the Chairman of the Falmouth Business Improvement District in this regard. Again residents parking schemes could be supplemented by allowing permit holders to park in off street sites free of charge overnight or at quieter times of the day or year.

Incentivising longer stays in the Town is to be encouraged. And it is noted that the 3 hour and 4 hour charging fees remain unchanged, whilst the 1 hour and 2 hour charges are increased. The Council would have preferred to have seen a reduction in the longer stay charging and no increases in short stay charging at all. The pay on exit arrangement is a very positive step and is strongly supported.

There is also a need at the other end of the scale and the Council would also like to see a free short stay period, say 20 or 30 minutes at The Moor, Church Street and Grove Place Car Parks, to enable

people to quickly access the town centre and alleviate much of the current unauthorised parking congestion that is caused by very short visits to shops now.

The more flexible options for short term cost effective season tickets that Cornwall Council had outlined are strongly supported. As are the electronic improvements.

The Council would also request that Cornwall Council look at offering a combined ticket for patrons of The Quarry Car Park that includes the fare of the Town Shuttle Bus Service.

The Council would request an input to parking enforcement, with local intelligence informing attendance. Also greater enforcement of the current town centre delivery restriction times.

(2) ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR, CRIME AND POLICING ACT 2014 – BEACH DOG CONTROL, CORNWALL

It was proposed by Councillor Gray, seconded by Councillor S D Eva and

RESOLVED that the introduction of Public Space Protection Orders in October 2017 be noted, and that the restrictions on Falmouth beaches reflected the views of the Falmouth Beach Management Group. Cornwall Council to be requested that in future reviews to consider setting a finite date, say the 1st May for the start of dog controls rather than Easter.

(3) POTENTIAL CORNWALL STAGE FOR TOUR OF BRITAIN

It was proposed by Councillor Ms Atherton, seconded by Councillor S D Eva and

RESOLVED that the Council strongly supports the representations by Helston Town Council to support a Cornwall stage for future Tour of Britain cycle events.

Councillor Evans and Ross requested that their names be recorded as having voted against this decision.

C4798 EXCLUSION OF THE PRESS AND PUBLIC

It was proposed by Councillor Chappel, seconded by Councillor Mrs Minson and

RESOLVED that in view of the confidential nature of property and contractual matters it is advisable in the public interest that the press and public be excluded from the meeting.

POLICE REPORT FOR TOWN COUNCIL MEETING – Monday 12TH DECEMBER 2016

The neighbourhood team have been compiling evidence in relation to two tenants of The Old Police Flats, Berkeley Vale. As a result of a lengthy process, liaising with the Anti-Social Behaviour Team, Sanctuary Housing as well as witnesses and victims of the incessant behaviour and antics at the location positive tenancy action has been taken at the address. Two tenants have been evicted. As a result of the action, the anti-social behaviour linked mainly to drug taking at the location has ceased. In addition the impact of the anti-social visitors to the address causing and creating crime at nearby retail outlets, The Moor area has reduced significantly. The address has been boarded up and secured for three months. This sends a clear message to other residents, visitors that any drug activity or anti-social behaviour will not be tolerated. It also acts as a stark reminder to housing providers, and private landlords the cost implications of three months with no rental income whilst the property is boarded up. We would encourage community intelligence on any addresses where there is information that would assist in the detection of anti-social behaviour and drug activity.

Partners met on the 21st of November at the Town Council Chambers to discuss the homeless situation in the Falmouth area experienced over the last year. The meeting was called with short notice but it was felt that a starting point was needed. Attendees and representatives from the Street Pastors, ASB Team, Salvation Army, St Petroc's, Falmouth Art Gallery, Stoneham Home group, Richard Gates Town Centre Manager and Mark Williams were present to discuss a national rise in homeless people, and what we can do locally to address the issue. Although a national problem, it was felt that Falmouth had seen a noticeable rise in homeless people in the town particularly over the summer period. Each partner agency made valuable inputs to the meeting and demonstrated some of the good work already happening locally. It was very clear from the outset that a solution to such a complex issue was not going to be found in one meeting! It was identified that for any local plan to be successful the involvement of Addaction, Mental Health services, perhaps Churches together, and other local volunteers groups and resources would add value to the process and will be invited to any future meetings. The starting point will be to document what is out there and available in the area already, and to then identify what else is needed to co-ordinate a plan locally for the future utilising some of the aforementioned services and volunteers. This will entail a huge amount of co-ordination. Falmouth Homeless Action Group an already existing group of like-minded individuals with shared goals comprise of a few of the above agencies who already meet monthly to discuss individuals and share information locally. To avoid any duplication of work any future meetings and actions would take place utilising the already existing network and Falmouth Homeless Action Group are meeting on the 19th of December and remains a work in progress. Also in addition a meeting is also taking place on the 16th of December to meet the newly appointed Environmental Education and Enforcement officer to see what part Mike Lynch can play in the plan. I will keep you all posted on the progress of the group.

With the approach of Christmas and New Year our resources will be stretched due to the increased night time economy including the infamous office party season. We will try to be as visible in the town centre on the days leading up to Christmas in an effort to reduce any shop lifting and retail theft which often unfortunately accompanies the festive season. We will also be assisting on Christmas Eve with the marshalling and passage of town users around the Harmony Choir event.

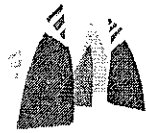
At the time of compiling this report the Outlaw Christmas Market plus the Santa Run and Live Nativity are due to take place. The Outlaw Christmas Market runs from the Thurs-Sat with the Santa Run also on the Saturday and the Live Nativity on the Sunday. All being well you are able to enjoy some or all of the events taking place over the weekend.

We also maximised the match funding pot this year working closely with Falmouth BID who paid for the Free car parking at the end of November as the first Xmas activity to help business in the town. Linking with the match funding we have provided 33 Christmas Trees throughout the town. This has been extremely well received and will no doubt increase in future years subject to budgets. The incentive was for businesses to open late on the late-night shopping. There were certainly more open for the switch on evening.

Following on from above the marquee on the Moor stays in place for more events such as the 'Cornwall Film Festival' screenings of 'Home Alone' and 'Gremlins', Tanya's Courage Trust Christmas Fayre and Frozen in Falmouth which was a huge success last year. Great British High Street finalist

There was great support from the town, both from businesses and the community throughout the month-long voting period. At the end of the voting we were second with Seaview Street in Cleethorpes ahead and Prestatyn lying in third. 50% of the score is down to the public vote and 50% based on the judges visit. The visit took place on Monday 14th of November and a lot of work by the Town Team went into arranging an in-depth two hours, highlighting our diverse high street and community.

We find out during the day on Monday 12th December (when Full Council is taking place) and will let Mark know if Falmouth has been successful. Whatever the result it is a great achievement on behalf of everyone involved to reach the final three of a national award that has received over 900 entries.

Devolution

Dracaena Recreation Area

Please find below the formal response of Falmouth Town Council on the consultation. This accompanies an on-line submission to both aspects of the consultation.

In regard to On Street Pay and Display Parking Proposals

The Council has responded via the online questionnaire and has identified the following locations as not suitable for on-street parking charging, basically this is all of the areas included in the current consultation. Namely, the Town Centre, Killigrew Street, Kimberley Park Road, High Street, Pendennis Headland, Cliff Road and Swanpool. The Council does not support any on-street parking charges for the Town and is opposed to the principle. The proposals are considered detrimental for the trading environment of the town centre and further discourages people from visiting. They will also hamper the ability of residents and visitors to access other important locations in Falmouth. The Council feels that pay on exit in existing off street parking places, reasonably priced shorter duration season tickets for off street parking sites, reduced short stay off street costs, enhanced shoppers shuttle bus services from outlying off street sites, and increased and better targetted enforcement are more appropriate measures. As is the progression of additional pedestrian priority measures for Market Street, Church Street and Arwenack Street and would wish to see the existing traffic bollard re-sited to Market Street/Market Place junction.

In regard to Residents Parking Proposals

The Council has responded via the online questionnaire and feels that the proposed FH01 to FH12 zones could be introduced but only where a majority of residents in those areas consulted wish them to be.

The Council does however wish the following issues addressed and controls to be in place:

- Permits to be at a reasonable cost per household, say £35 per annum.
- Permitted vehicles to be limited to two per property. Including sub-divided properties.
- Better enforcement and control of camper vans and people sleeping in vehicles overnight.
- Better targetted parking enforcement and additional yellow lines and signage.
- Provision made for care providers who have to attend to residents in their homes in permit zones.
- Provision for cross pollination of permits e.g. if a permit holder is unable to park in FH02 say, will their permit allow them to park in adjoining zones FH01 or FH03?
- There should be further consideration of FH D01 and FH D02 as there was risk of displacement parking from zones FH01 to FH 05 exacerbating parking issues therein.
- FH 12 may cause displacement parking in the layby overlooking Falmouth Docks. This would temper the above response regarding limited waiting restrictions in that area.

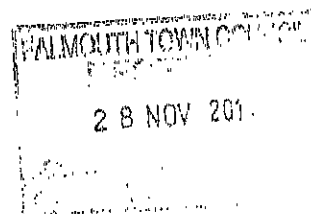

I'm writing to let you know that this week, the Government has given the go ahead for £12.7m of investment in Falmouth University's ground-breaking postgraduate business incubation and acceleration programme, Launchpad. The programme is part-funded by the European Regional Development Fund, Cornwall Council and Falmouth University.

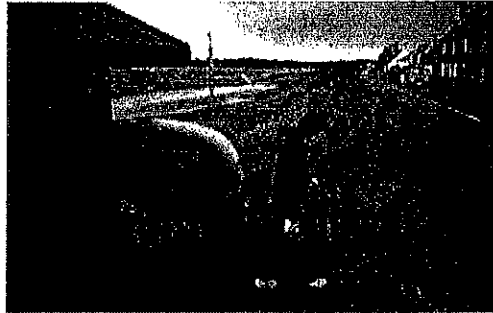

Post Offices - Consultation

The Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy has published a consultation on the post office network, with the aim of establishing a clear evidence-base of customer needs in order to aid future funding discussions with Post Office Limited.

The Government is making funding available to ensure that commitments can be met to maintaining a national network of post office branches that is accessible to all and to secure the future of 3,000 rural outlets.



Of course, many of these rural areas are represented by parish councils and the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy therefore wants to encourage responses to this consultation, particularly from those people or groups with a strong interest in the future of the post office network

The National Association of Local Councils (NALC) fully supports the funding made available to the Post Office Network to maintain a national network and has issued an Initial response which is being circulated with this News Roundup and can also be found on the Documents section of our website.

Now that the main closure programme from the Post Office has been completed, NALC wants to join Rural Coalition partners to ensure that Post Offices eligible to apply for this new funding consult their parish councils and residents in parished areas to ensure that the types of facility being proposed will meet local demand.

**Antisocial Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 –Beach Dog Control,
Cornwall**

You may be aware that new legislation has replaced the power to make dog control orders under the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005.

Under the new Antisocial Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 – Beach Dog Control order all existing Dog Control Orders will automatically become Public Space Protection Orders (PSPO's) in October 2017; after this date all PSPO's will have to be renewed every three years, which means that all dog fouling, prohibition and dogs on leads orders will have to be reviewed and renewed by October 2020 at the latest.

Cornwall Council has committed to review all existing dog control provisions within our control, taking into account the changes in legislation. The initial part of this review is looking at dog control on beaches.

We think the best way to introduce the new PSPO legislation changes to ban dogs from specific beaches in Cornwall, is to:

- 1) Revoke all existing Dog Control Orders on the beaches listed on the consultation.
- 2) Revoke all existing Dog Prohibitions under the Cornwall County Council Act 1984 on the beaches listed on the consultation.
- 3) Create new Public Space Protection Orders for the beaches listed on the consultation.

We propose to keep the same conditions, times, dates and durations currently in place under the existing dog control and dog ban orders, on the designated beaches in Cornwall, listed in schedule 1 enclosed with this letter.

Dear Town or Parish Clerk,

Introduction

I am writing to each of the Town and Parish Councils in Cornwall to gauge interest in Cornwall hosting a stage of the Tour of Britain cycling race.

The Tour of Britain is British cycling's premier road cycling event and the UK's national Tour.

Held annually, it is a multi-stage race that takes place on British roads over a week in early September. This year 21 teams, each consisting of 6 riders departed Glasgow and after 7 stages covering England and Wales, completed the race in London. The world's governing body in the sport, the Union Cycliste Internationale (UCI) classifies the race in a category second only to the top category that includes races such as the Tour de France. As such, it attracts some of the best teams and riders in the World including this year, Team Sky, Mark Cavendish and Sir Bradley Wiggins.

The Tour of Britain is recognised as one of the most significant sporting events in the UK. It has recently been shortlisted at the Global Sport Tourism Awards in the category, Sport Tourism Major Event alongside other events such as the Rugby World Cup.

Media interest is substantial with daily live TV coverage and a highlights show. The race was also widely reported across international and national press. It also received substantial online interest including many social media followers.

As a result of conversations I have had with the Tour organisers, it is considered that Cornwall could host a stage and a bid from the County would be considered for either 2019 or 2020. Constraints imposed by Tour organisers necessitate a finish in or around either Plymouth or Exeter. Whilst the geography of Cornwall normally provides challenges in many areas of everyday life, it is the perfect shape to host a day of top-class racing and an opportunity to showcase the County to the World. In 2015, coverage of the Tour was broadcast in 129 countries.

Facts and Figures

To give some understanding regarding the impact of the event, the following are stats from the 2015 Tour of Britain:

- Eurosport and ITV4: Shown live, plus daily 1hr highlights
- BBC Radio 5Live and local BBC and commercial coverage
- 8.2 million viewers on ITV

- Broadcast in 129 countries
- 116.5 million potential worldwide TV audience
- Extensive editorial features in cycling press
- 154,000 average spectators per stage
- 18% of visitors stayed overnight
- 67% of spectators inspired to cycle more often
- Press coverage: 33 international titles, 13 national newspapers, 33 regional titles
- Online coverage: 4,300,000 page views, 110,000 social media followers
- £4.1m – average net economic impact per stage

Considerations

There are many issues to consider when delivering such a prestigious event. However, at this stage I want to address two key issues that I think will be at the core of peoples thinking when considering support for this project:

- Disruption
- Funding

To minimise disruption to the local infrastructure and road-users, the Tour of Britain uses a policy of rolling-road closures. Roads are temporarily closed to allow the race to pass through. Typical periods of closure are between 15–40 minutes.

Such an event does not come for free. It is expected that the core cost of hosting a stage of the Tour of Britain in 2019 will be c£200k. As the stage would have to finish outside the County, it is anticipated that this cost will be shared with the authority hosting the finish of the stage. Whilst there will be additional costs in hosting a stage of the Tour of Britain, it should be emphasised that the average net economic impact for a stage in the 2015 Tour was £4.1m.

Summary

Gauging interest and securing funding are essential elements when considering such an event. At Town and Parish Council level, I believe what we can bring to the table is a statement of support that the event would be welcomed to Cornwall. A strong statement of support would very clearly say to Cornwall Council (CC) that the people would like the County to host a stage of the Tour of Britain and that their Council should work towards delivering this project.

I hope this gives you a flavour of what a significant event the Tour of Britain is to the UK sport and tourism market and that you are enthused enough to support the proposal. It is an opportunity to showcase Cornwall's unique culture and spectacular landscape, whilst extending the tourist season and providing a much-needed boost to the economy.

I have written this letter to ask each of the Town and Parish Councils in Cornwall to align themselves with one or more of the following statements:

- We support the Tour of Britain cycling race coming to Cornwall
- We support the Tour of Britain cycling race passing through our Parish or Town
- We do not support the Tour of Britain cycling race passing through our Parish or Town
- We do not support the Tour of Britain cycling race coming to Cornwall

Please feel free to add any other statements that you consider represent your views on this subject but please make a clear statement of support or otherwise. Once Town and Parish Councils have responded I will write to CC outlining the collective

view.

Preventing ill health and more care at home are at the heart of health and social care plans for Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly

Health and care organisations in Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly have published today their outline proposals for service transformation over the next five years.

The local Sustainability and Transformation Plan (STP) is a response to the NHS England Five Year Forward View and Devolution Deal for Cornwall to achieve three aims:

- Improve the health and wellbeing of the local population.
- Improve the quality of local health and care services.
- Deliver financial stability in the local health and care system.

The Transformation Board which is made up of all the leaders from the major public sector health and care organisations is engaging with clinicians, practitioners, stakeholders and most importantly citizens to shape future services.

In the latest plans (Draft Outline Business Case), health and care leaders set out the priorities, principles and actions for the next five years and seek the views of the local population on the work so far.

From Monday 28 November until Friday 20 January, citizens will have a chance to have their say on the local draft plans through a survey or series of community events. Following this period of engagement, detailed plans will be developed with consultation on any major service changes taking place from the summer 2017.

The focus within the latest STP document is on preventing ill health and providing as much care as possible at home or in the community. At the moment care is too reactive, not achieving best outcomes and based on an expensive hospital based model that is now outdated.

On preventing ill health, we know that today 5 lifestyle behaviours – alcohol, smoking, physical inactivity, diet and social isolation – contribute to 5 diseases which cause 75% of premature death and disability. In Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly too many of us are not living well and 20% of NHS costs are associated with these harmful lifestyle behaviours.

We also know that we need to provide more care at home. Right now around 60 people each day are staying in a bed at Royal Cornwall Hospitals and they don't need to be there. 35% of community hospital bed days are being used by people who are fit to leave. A third of people in a community hospital or nursing/residential care are not in an appropriate place. Much of this is because we have our resources and money in the wrong place and sadly this is affecting older people the most.

Phil Confue, Senior Responsible Officer for the Sustainability and Transformation Plan and Chief Executive of the Cornwall Partnership NHS Foundation Trust says: "In the next five years, we have a once in a generation opportunity to change the way we provide health and social care services for the people of Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly".

"The current health and social care system needs reform and we must seize the moment. Lifestyles, communities and technology have changed and our approach has become outdated, fragmented and reactive. Local services must adapt to meet the needs of the current and future population - including those who visit our region each year. We must put more focus and resources into preventing ill health, keeping people in their homes or communities and adapting services for a growing, ageing and technology enabled population".

"We want to continue to involve the local community in developing the solutions in the months ahead and we want to hear from as many people as possible on the priorities and approach we are taking. The time and opportunity has come to take control and shape our own future".
