C5107 APOLOGIES

Apologies for absence were received and approved from Councillors Evans (holiday) and Gillett (ill).

C5108 INTERESTS

C5110 TOWN MAYOR'S REPORT

The Town Mayor reported on a busy Civic calendar and mayoral activity. He thanked those Councillors who had supported him with Remembrance and Christmas events.

The Deputy Mayor presented the Mayor with a Council plaque to recognise his longstanding role as Beacon Regeneration Project Co-ordinator as that project had come to an end.

C5111 PUBLIC QUESTIONS

None received.

C5112 WESTERN POWER UTILITY WORKS IN 2019

John Nesbitt Distribution Manager for Western Power Distribution (WPD) advised that Phase II works of the five year programme would be undertaken in Falmouth between January and April 2019. Connection works for properties from Phase I works (and replace cobbles) and excavation between Market Street (junction with Fish Strand Hill) and Church Corner. WPD were working with traders and the Town Team and he outlined mitigation measures that again would be provided in partnership and a drop in shop would be available. A temporary tarmac surface would be provided at conclusion of Phase II. Display boards would be provided. He responded to members questions confirmed that WPD were not funded by ratepayers and the Council thanked WPD for assisting the additional mitigation measures.

C5113 AMBOS CO-HOUSING

Miguel Fernandez and Becky Payne updated the Council regarding co-housing and the Falmouth proposal at Tregenver Road. There was a 30 strong group of local residents. They had discussed the scheme with Cornwall Council regarding retention of Adult Education Services and the recreation field, but not yet with the Falmouth Academy Trust. They hoped Cornwall Council's extra care housing proposal would be compatible and not stymie the co-housing proposal. They responded to members questions and hoped the two Councils could work together with the Co-housing Group to progress the scheme.

The Mayor requested that Councillor Saunby updates the Council regarding the extra care housing scheme as the Town Council had not been consulted.

Penwerris

Councillor McCarthy reported upon the Cornwall Council Motion for a Peoples Vote regarding EU citizens rights in Cornwall. He was frustrated at the Sport England objection to the Dracaena Skatepark planning application, he had requested the Cornwall Council Leader to attend to see the proposal. Further the Electoral Division Review had been completed and the next stage would be a Community Governance Review to look at Falmouth Parish boundaries.

Trescobeas

Councillor Saunby advised he abstained on the Peoples Vote. He reported that the planning application for 66 Acacia Road had been refused by Cornwall Council. The Rosslyn Hotel development as student accommodation was progressing, he queried if there remained sufficient demand.

Smithick

Councillor Kirkham reported that Cornwall Council had recently debated Brexit implications, the issue of 2nd homes regulation, walking to school policy and the Stadium for Cornwall proposal. The next refuse and recycling contract was being consulted on and she urged all to input to that. Cornwall Council were also looking at acquiring more emergency housing provision and a view around living rents.

Boslowick

Councillor Jewell did not agree with the Peoples Vote proposal. He reported that highway drainage remediation work by Cornwall Council was currently not good enough.

Introduction

The data used for compiling this report has solely come from the Cornwall Council Resilient Cornwall Fire and Rescue Service reporting site. The tracker is used as a method of recording the service activities with regard to our Service delivery and core values covering Protection, Prevention and Response.

Protection

Tactical Information Files – for higher risk premises

The watches completed **8** site visits this period, from St Michaels Hotel to the Engineering shed at Falmouth Docks.

A TIF visit is an information gathering exercise where watches collate and check the data held about commercial premises.

An example of the sort of premises covered by a TIF would be a large manufacturing company, or a medium-large hotel. Watches have also visited vessels at Falmouth Docks for information gathering i.e. The World and RFA Tideforce.

Operation Fire Safety Visits – for lower risk premises

The watches completed **6** site visits, in this area of work.

An OFSV is a brief visit carried out on premises whose risk is deemed to be more generic. The aims are to identify the use and occupier of the building, and to inform and advise the occupier of their legal responsibility to protect from the risk of fire in line with the Regulatory Reform Fire Safety Order 2005.

Prevention

Home Fire Safety Checks

During this quarter, crews carried out **144 HFSCs**.

This is a free service we offer to all residents, be they home owners or tenants. The crew base their advice around a booklet entitled Fire Safety in the Home, but tailor the information specifically to the hazards identified during their visit. The crew also carry free smoke detectors to fit if appropriate.

Community Engagement

During the quarter, crews were involved in a number of separate community events. Activity varies from small support groups for those with dementia to whole-year school groups, and everything in between.

There has been joint focus from all watches delivering road safety awareness to primary schools within Falmouth. This was as a result of reported incidents where children were injured as a result of crossing the road.

Black watch WM John Palmer leads his team in community youth engagement with weekly engagement sessions at Falmouth Youth Club and regularly works with the Friends of Tregonnigie Woodland maintaining the pathways and environment there.

The annual Fireworks Display again proved successful with approximately 4000 people attending. Funds raised approximately £6000 for local charities and other good causes, all requests will be accepted and presented early next year.

This event complimented our Service priorities and helped to raise awareness by promoting safety by community engagement and reducing potential harm from private firework use.

Town Management Report to Falmouth Town Council 10/12/18

Cornwall Council car park pricing 2019

This has moved on significantly since the last report and we have reached agreement at the last traders meeting with a unanimous decision in support of our suggested tariffs for Spring/Summer and Autumn Winter 19/20. It is important to point out that we are working within a budget figure that Cornwall Council want to achieve so while we would like the prices to be even lower it is a big step forward.

At the time of compiling the report I am waiting on a confirmed date for consultation and it will depend on the suggested prices being confirmed when it is the public domain. The key point about the proposed pricing is trying to make it fairer across the tariffs as much as we can within the parameters the Town Team are working with.

I will be sending out to the town a much easier to understand detail of pricing that was explained at the traders meeting in comparison to the Cornwall Council one that includes all car parks across the county.

Western Power works 2019

You will have heard from Jon Nesbitt earlier in the evening but for support this year from Falmouth Town Council, Falmouth BID and Western Power Distribution we are doing a Pirate FM campaign as well as info in both the Falmouth Packet and West Briton. Looking at the number using the shuttle bus earlier this year a large majority were concession passengers. After discussing costing with OTS and the right approach the shuttle bus will run as it normally does throughout the year (albeit on a different route due to the works and different timetable) and we will be putting on FREE parking in all Cornwall Council car parks for all Friday's and Saturday's during the works. This really helped both business and the community for the first phase and while it is challenging with these continued works it goes some way to assisting during the first quarter of the year.

BID Renewal 2018

Falmouth's Business Improvement District (BID) was first voted in, in April 2009 and has been operating for ten years having been successfully renewed for a second term in 2014.

Over the past five years, the not-for-profit Falmouth BID has invested levy payer's money into Falmouth and the resulting achievements have directly contributed to Falmouth being recognised as the UK's Best Coastal Community in the Government's Great British High Street awards. The BID's long-standing strong relationship with the Falmouth Town Council has led to the formation of the Falmouth Town Team; an award-winning partnership that proactively manages our town; delivering the destination marketing campaigns, year-round festivals calendar, business support programmes, public realm improvements and more.

Every five years, the business community (over 400 businesses who pay into the BID) has a view and helps shape town investment via an independently-run BID ballot process (managed by Cornwall Council's Electoral Services division). If a successful yes vote for a third, five-year Falmouth BID term is secured, over £800,000 of funds will be raised and allocated over that timeframe to once again deliver vital projects to support the town. The national trading picture is challenging and so the more proactive and engaged we can continue to be as a town, the better. We have an award-winning town; a result of a lot of effort, quality town projects, vibrant businesses and proactive organisations/volunteers working together with the Falmouth Town Team. So, the BID ballot is all about engaging with the business community to try and ensure this vital resource continues to support the town as innovatively as possible.

At the time of writing, the result of the month-long ballot is not known as this will be announced on Friday 7th December.

If the Falmouth BID is voted in for a third term in December 2018, a dedicated board of volunteer, non-executive directors would continue to support one BID manager in delivering a programme of projects and initiatives.

Led by the business communities in which they serve, there are now over 300 BIDs operating across the UK; investing millions of pounds into cities, towns and industrial areas.

Falmouth Christmas 2018
