The Cultural Services Director presented her report that was duly noted and forms part of these minutes.

Further she provided detail of the nominal expenses and Cultural Services budget update for 2018/19, with a more detailed break down of Gallery Shop income (£26,000), donations (£61,000) and grants (£55,000). This was duly noted.

Further in regard to acquisitions she reported two opportunities to acquire important works for the Town Collection.

Introduction

This report covers the ten weeks since the Cultural Services committee meeting on 7th January 2019 which was held in the Council Chamber.

Library and Information Service

- 1.1 The Library continues to run smoothly with regular *rhyme time* and *story time* sessions on a Tuesday and *Lego Club* every Saturday morning. We are sounding out the popularity of introducing a Chess club.
- 1.2 The last monthly statistical report issued by Cornwall Council was for January 2019
 The total footfall remains fairly consistent at 10,017, books issued 8,078, new
 borrowers 88 with 905 computer sessions booked.
- 1.3 Councillors have expressed a wish to open the Information Service on Saturday mornings and we are exploring ways in which we can support this (see section 7 staffing)
- 1.4 To celebrate International Women's day and as part of the *Library Universal Offer*Sara Baistrocchi, supported by other members of the Cultural Services team,
 organised a World of Women festival from 7th -10th March.
- Over the four days and evenings, events, talks, films and workshop activities aimed at women of all ages and abilities took place in the Library, the Gallery and Chamber. Most of the sixteen events were fully booked and the feedback was very positive (example at Appendix A).
- 1.6 This type of programming also fulfils our commitment to the health and wellbeing strand funded by Arts Council England through the Cornwall Museums Partnership. The five principles of the weekend were connect notice learn exercise volunteer.

Art Gallery:

- 2. Supporters Scheme, donations, grant Income and awards
- 2.1 We have received £61,545 in the financial year 2018/19.
- 3. Acquisitions, Gifts and Bequests
- 3.1 Joanna Mattingley has gifted us an etching by William Martin depicting Market Street in Falmouth.
- 3.2 We purchased for £200 a maquette of the medallion made by the late artist Peter Wright depicting a Falmouth Packet. The roundel was set in the arch over the High

Street as part of the Packet Quay development. The maquette will go in the first floor of the Old Post Office.

4. Exhibitions and displays

- 4.1 The exhibition A Good Night: Nocturnes for Night Owls finished on 30th March and is being replaced with The World as Yet Unseen, Women Artists in Conversation with Partou Zia. This exhibition has been curated by Professor Penny Florence PhD of the Slade School of Fine Art and Clare Cooper of Art First who was Partou's gallerist. This exhibition has a preview evening on Saturday 6th April from 6:00-8:00 and runs until 15th June.
- 4.2 The entrance gallery currently features *René Halkett From Bauhaus to Cornwall* it has been curated by freelance writer Marcus Williamson who has had a long association with the Art Gallery. The exhibition runs until 11th May, 2019.
- 4.3 To complement the World as Yet Unseen, our Citizen Curators are curating a show of work in the community stair gallery that has been inspired by the Art Gallery's Margaret Whitford bequest. Citizen curators is a volunteer programme that is also funded by the Art Council England through the Cornwall Museums Partnership.

- 6.1 Community engagement continues to be at the heart of all our activities and over the next three years we are particularly targeting young people in the 11-25 age range. We have been running a series of workshops for the WILD young mothers
- 6.2 Regular sessions for local poetry groups, , Sketch Club, Look Group (who had a talk from Marcus Williamson on the *René Halkett* exhibition) , Knit Group, Langholme, Stroke Club and our drop in family workshops on the first Saturday of each month. We have also hosted two Zero waste/recycling workshops.
- 6.3 Mawnan WI art appreciation group visited the *René Halkett* exhibition and Truro U3A History Group also visited both groups received a talk from the Director.
- 6.4 We received visits from St Francis, King Charles Art Ambassadors, Marlborough School, St Mary's reception, Perranarworthal, , Truro College SEN groups and Mullion nursery.
- 6.5 The Director gave a talk to Carnon Downs Old Cornwall Society and has attended the annual Cornish Heritage Awards.
- 6.6 Professor Penny Florence PhD gave an illustrated talk to the Citizen Curators and Margaret Whitford and her legacy.
- 6.7 As part of the Spring Festival, Jean Carr installed a display in the MB foyer detailing the fascinating history of the daffodil trains.
- 6.8 Jo Clarkson has been running a project with community groups exploring Fibonacci theories by painting sunflower heads. A display of these has also been put up in the MB Foyer.
- 6.9 The MB Foyer also hosted Fairtrade Falmouth for two weeks.

7. Staffing, training and volunteering

- 7.1 Alex Hooper has not been well since the start of the year and has decided after 31 years of service to retire. He was working four days a week. His retirement combined with Pat Collinson's two and half days a week provides us with an opportunity to reflect on the changes that have taken place in Cultural Services and to redeploy the resource most efficiently without losing our excellent visitor services.
- 7.2 The Director will present a draft staffing structure for discussion by the committee and if approved that will then be taken to the Staffing committee.
- 7.3 Natalie Rigby and Henrietta Boex have completed 'working at height' training.

Youth Services

8.1 Kate Springfield will be reporting twice annually at the end of March and September. Her report will be carried forward to the next meeting.

Festivals & Events

9.1 This is covered by the Town Team's report to full council

Parks & Gardens

- 10.1 Jacqui Owen has continued to roll out the Cornwall Urban Buzz project in Falmouth. She also organised the school's who came to paint the Town Yellow and played a major role in the Spring Flower Festival held over the 23-24th March weekend.
- 10.2 Children from Falmouth Schools will shortly be planting up the beds in Queen Mary Gardens.


Ponsharden Cemeteries
