C5218 TOWN MAYOR'S REPORT

The Town Mayor reported upon his civic attendances including: CCTV Stakeholders, Outdoor Gym opening at Dracaena, Prislow Fields Wild Flower Walk, Sea Shanty Festival, Falmouth Classics, Murdoch Day, Falmouth School Technical Awards, Civic Services at Penzance, Newquay and Wadebridge, Garden Party at Exeter University, Reception with the High Sheriff, West Cornwall Search and Rescue, South West In Bloom, Falmouth University and Exeter University in Cornwall Graduation Ceremonies. Further he had undertaken training to enable him to serve the Staffing Committee.

He advised that Sea Sunday had been the inaugural use of the event suite at the Council Offices. He recommended that this be named after former Councillor Candy Atherton who had been instrumental in the development of the facilities.

RESOLVED unanimously that the event suite in the Council Offices be named the Atherton Suite.

C5219 DEPUTY MAYOR'S REPORT

The Deputy Mayor reported on her civic attendances including: both Exeter University in Cornwall Excellence Awards and Voices Launch, GLL Sports Foundation presentations, Cornwall RFU celebrations, Penryn Sea Cadets presentations, South West In Bloom, Sea Sunday assistance and the 150th Anniversary event for Earle's Retreat.

C5220 PUBLIC QUESTIONS

None received.

C5221 CORNWALL COUNCIL WASTE CONTRACT UDATE

Rachel Reid, Waste and Recycling Community Support Officer with her colleagues presented on the new contract that would be effective from April 2020 and rolled out fully by April 2021. She advised that Cornwall now sent no rubbish to landfill and had not done so since 2018. The energy Recovery Centre processed 240,000 tons per annum. The Council recycled 99.5% of the recyclable material it collected. She outlined the kerbside compositional analysis. Cornwall was the only SW area still undertaking weekly refuse collections. This would revert to fortnightly under the new contract, with weekly recycling including food composting. Where possible wheelie bins would be provided with a closed lid policy. They responded to members questions.

C5222 POLICE LICENSING OFFICER

Sue Edwards attended at the Mayor's invitation to provide the Council with clarity on her role and the Cumulative Impact Zone in Falmouth. She covered mid-Cornwall and was one of 8 consultees asked to comment on licensing applications by the Licensing Authority. She liaised with local officers and provided comments looking at how licensing applications might impact on crime and disorder. The Town Council ask her to inform it and she was happy to do so. Residents and the Council can comment and have as much say. Falmouth was in a good position with a flourishing night time economy. She responded to questions.

The Town Mayor thanked Sue Edwards for her presentation and requested she continues to assist the Town Council's Licensing Committee by providing her observations

C5223 MOTION BY COUNCILLOR ROSS – FALMOUTH SCHOOL

Councillor Ross requested deferment of his Motion given the improvements being reported by the school. The Motion had been 'the Council notes the recent OFSTED report regarding Falmouth School and wishes to show its concern in this matter.' The Town Mayor concurred that the Council should await the OFSTED review of its recommendations.

C5224 POLICE REPORT

Sergeant Kelly reported some significant local developments and arrests regarding anti-social behaviour and drug issues. The Police were aware of issues of rough-sleeping, street drinking and aggressive begging. The Office of Police and Crime Commissioner had commissioned the Falmouth Community Connectivity Plan 2019 (attached to these minutes). The local priorities were safeguarding the vulnerable, anti-social behaviour and commercial burglaries. The sector would see four additional officers. He responded to members questions.

C5225 COMMUNITY SAFETY AND FIRE RESCUE REPORT

None received.

C5226 COMMUNITY NETWORK REPORT

The Community Link Officer reported the minutes of the Panel held on 2nd July 2019 with the Forward Plan 2019 and Climate Change and Waste Contract Update that was duly noted.

Further she requested that the Council notify highways scheme proposals by 9th August 2019. Cornwall Council were working to progress the Tranche 4 asset devolution matters. She continued to work closely with local community groups.

C5227 CORNWALL COUNCILLORS REPORTS

Smithick

Councillor Kirkham reported that the development at Fish Strand Hill had commenced and a strict construction management plan was in place. With the homelessness presence at Quarry Car Park there was a multi-agency effort to assist them and additional CCTV provision was being provided. She encouraged Councillors to get engaged with the local patient participation group as Falmouth had a low take up. A planning appeal for a property at Pengarth Road had been refused. Cornwall Council's Cabinet were considering the Climate Change report. Also highway safety improvement changes were progressing for Dracaena Avenue.

Boslowick

Councillor Jewell reported pragmatic changes to the Linden Homes development at Swanpool. He had undertaken hedge trimming for the Town Council. He reported a spate of thefts in his area and hoped that Cornwall Council would quickly sort out the issues with the Divers Car Park at Pendennis.

Arwenack

Councillor Evans advised Divers Car Park was progressing as were yellow lines schemes at Spernen Wyn Road and Boscawen Road. He was also looking at parking in Grove Hill Crescent and progressing a pedestrian island in Woodlane. He was pleased to note Arwenack had the best kerbside recycling rates in Cornwall. He also reported upon current planning applications at the Space Station meeting at Newquay.

Trescobeas

Councillor Saunby reported parking issues regarding the former Roslyn Hotel redevelopment and he had spoken to the developer. Traffic calming at Highfield and Mayfield Roads were progressing as was Trescobeas Road (from Union Corner) with new signage. He had undertaken some path cutting in advance of Network Rail works at Hayman Way.

Penwerris

No report. In response to a question the Town Mayor advised that he had requested a written report from Councillor McCarthy.

FALMOUTH FAIRTRADE

- Steering Group continue to meet every two months. Membership of the steering group is a concern an increase in membership would enable the group to be more proactive.
- Parklive June 2019. Our plans to have a Fairtrade stand in June was unable to go ahead as the event was cancelled by organisers due to unfinished stage. We will explore the possibility of a FT stand at the August event when the group meets 15th July 2019.
- Fairtrade on Town signage. We are very pleased that it has been agreed in principle to add Fairtrade to Falmouth's town signs.
- Living Income Project. Donations to this project makes programmes such as the Women's School of Leadership in Cote d'Ivoire possible. A donation of £90 was raised for this project at the Fairtrade Fortnight Coffee morning this year. A certificate has been received acknowledging this donation. The 'Living Income' petition calling on the UK government to lead the way in making living incomes a priority in UK-funded international aid projects has reached a total of 45,185 signatures the goal is 50,000. See FT Foundation website to add your name.
- Fairtrade Window decals. We have ordered 100 free window decals from Fairtrade postage costs £5.80. These will be offered to retail outlets as and when we have time to visit.
- Fairtrade Foundation and other certified organizations. A member of the steering group has been compiling data which is now available for use by steering group members.
- **SW Fairtrade Supporter Conference.** Members of the steering group are planning to attend the conference in Exeter, 21st September 2019
- 25 Years of the Fairtrade mark/certification will be celebrated by the Fairtrade Foundation October 2019.

Town Management Report to Falmouth Town Council 22/07/19

Falmouth International Sea Shanty Festival

An extremely busy festival which continues to grow year on year. Feedback has been very positive especially due to the sheer numbers within the town and particularly on the Saturday. There have been a number of constructive points of how to develop the festival. The big challenge we have is that costs are continually increasing and more facilities and support are required to make sure it continues to be successful as the operational commitment is significant. This year for example we greatly increased the First Aid capacity and on the Saturday afternoon there were several incidents within a three to four hour period and all were dealt with professionally and effectively. It is important to highlight that not one of the incidents was related to alcohol so it shows the positive atmosphere.

Falmouth Classics

The Classics is going from strength to strength with 190 boats taking part this year and continues to compliment the shanty festival very well. The oldest boat this year was built in 1878 so a great amount of history. This event gets my full support and I hope the councils as it fits so well on the calendar and with people travelling from so many destinations as well as local entrants.

Falmouth Week

New for 2019 we will have a giant five metre screen which will be on the Moor for the first four days of the week. This will have games that people can interact on their phones on such dune buggy racing and snowboarding for up to thirty people at a time. There will also be social media feeds that is pulled in through this as well as free to air sport such as the rugby world cup. Lots of information on the weeks activities as well as highlighting sponsors (including Falmouth Town Council & Falmouth BID).

The Air Show is coming together well and everything is with the Civil Aviation Authority, they give permission no later than fourteen days leading up the event and while this is very short notice our Flight Display Director has done an excellent job of ensuring as much detail is with the CAA so all being well subject to the usual weather etc it can all go ahead. Falmouth Harbour Commissioners are helping lots as are the yacht clubs with support craft on the water and managing the display area. The big difference for this year is that the display area will take place within Falmouth Bay closer to the shore and spectator boats.

The programme is currently being printed and will be available very soon, there is a whole array of different activities from the daytime to the evening entertainment as well as all the sailing taking place in the Carrick Roads and the bay.

On top of everything above we are working on updating the FalmouthWeek.co.uk site to a more usable system from an administration point of view as well as user experience.

Sponsorship

It is important to highlight that sponsorship across the various events is becoming more and more difficult while still trying to develop and improve the events year on year. Understandably all businesses are having to watch their outgoings more closely year on year. For Falmouth Week this year both my event budget and also Falmouth BIDs' budget are using a greater proportion in order to achieve what is required.

Western Power

There will be further updates later this month to traders for the next phase of road closures that we have been working closely with Western Power and Kier to work out the best option. It is being finalised at the moment so there will be more details at next Full Council.

Falmouth School Enterprise Day

I recently took part in a morning up at Falmouth School for pupils who all had to work in small teams to come up with a business pitch with support from business mentors.

<u>Awards</u>

Richard Wilcox and I were very pleased with the two awards at the recent ATCM (Association of Town & City Management) conference in London. The 'Digital Project of the year' we thought had a good chance with the wifi project which of course is a partnership project between Falmouth BID, Falmouth University and ourselves as a council. With over 32,000 people who have signed up in the last year it has surpassed our original estimates substantially. The 'Partnership of the Year' award was a real long shot. There are so many places across the UK that enter this category being a finalist was great acknowledgement to everyone involved. Actually winning when the other two finalists were Belfast City and a borough of London really highlights the effective partnership between the Town Council, BID and many other organisations on a national level. The partnership award was the final award of the evening and when completing the entry we took a very honest approach to all the challenges the town has as well as the successes.

Further to our previous letter, we are writing to you as part of a formal consultation process regarding our current programme of intended public payphone removals. This letter formally starts our consultation with you and the local community.

There are currently 104 public payphones in your area which have been identified and proposed for removal by BT under the 90-day consultation process and details of these payphones are shown below.

To ensure that the local community are fully informed, we have placed consultation notices on the relevant payphones, and a sample notice is enclosed. We have also included the date we posted these notices on the payphones. The consultation period will close on 07 October 2019. <u>Unless you contact us to agree otherwise</u>, responses received after this date will not be accepted.

This consultation process gives your local communities the opportunity to adopt a traditional red 'heritage' phone box and make them an asset that local people can enjoy. It's really simple to do and it costs just £1 - http://bt.com/adopt

Overall use of payphones has declined by over 90 per cent in the last decade and the need to provide payphones for use in emergency situations is diminishing all the time, with at least 98 per cent of the UK having either 3G or 4G coverage. This is important because as long as there is network coverage, it's now possible to call the emergency services, even when there is no credit or no coverage from your own mobile provider.

You may also want to consider the recent Ofcom affordability report which found that most people do not view payphones as essential for most consumers in most circumstances -

On the 14th March 2006 the Office of Communications (Ofcom) published a statement following their 2005 review of universal service in the Telecommunications market, which includes a requirement for payphone provision to meet reasonable needs. Part of that statement amended our obligations with regard to the

As stated in Ofcom's 2005 review, it is the responsibility of the local authority to initiate its own consultation process to canvas the views of the local community. They would normally expect these consultations to involve other public organisations such as the Parish or Community councils and work within the terms of the Communications Act 2003. This means that you must be able to objectively justify your decisions.

If the decision is that the local community wish to 'adopt', please provide their contact details and we'll do the rest.

If you wish to 'object', you'll need to complete the last column with your reasons, having reviewed all of the factors set out in Annex 1 of Ofcom's guidance (see link above), and the information sent to you in our previous letter.

If the information is incomplete for any payphone in the list, then we'll assume you have no objection to its removal and also that you do not wish to adopt it.

BT uses its own published criteria (<u>www.bt.com/payphones/removals</u>) when considering which public call boxes to remove. These are intended to ensure that boxes are retained either where they are actively used or where there is a social need for their retention.

BT's 'overriding criteria' for payphone retention are:

- No mobile coverage (from any provider);
- Suicide hotspot;
- Accident blackspot;
- Coastal location.

Its 'reasonable needs' criteria are:

- The public call box in question is the only one within 800 metres;
- There are at least 500 households within 1 kilometre;
- At least 12 calls have been made from the public call box within the previous 12 months.

If a public call box meets any of the overriding criteria or all the reasonable needs criteria, BT has stated that it will not be proposed for removal.

Can a local authority veto the removal of a public call box because it is a local landmark or on 'heritage' grounds?

Ofcom's Guidance sets out matters that local authorities should take into account when making a decision to consent or object to BT's proposal to remove the last box from a site. In particular, at Annex 1 it sets out factors which Ofcom considers relevant to the decision. The Guidance explains that local authorities should refer to these factors and publish the reasons for their decision. BT could challenge a veto that it considers to be inappropriate in the Competition Appeal Tribunal.

BT's Universal Service Obligation applies to the telephone, not the kiosk. It would therefore be inappropriate for a local authority to object to removal of a public call box because it is a local landmark or on 'heritage' grounds. However, BT has a scheme (www.bt.com/adopt) whereby klosks can be 'adopted' by bodies such as parish councils for £1. The telephone equipment is removed, and the klosk can then be used for another purpose such as a community book exchange.

Can a local authority veto all public call box removals in its area?

Each public call box should be considered separately. Any local authority objection to removal of a public call box should be supported by clear, objective and proportionate reasons, related to the provision of the communications service at the box in question.

Can Ofcom give us more information about the public call boxes in our area?

Ofcom does not hold details of the locations of public call boxes or individual boxes that BT may be proposing for removal. BT will be able to give you information about the boxes in your area.

Public call box removals

BT is cuffently engaged in a round of public call box removals and may be contacting you to seek your views, in accordance with regulatory obligations imposed by Ofcom. This letter gives more information about your role as a relevant local authority under those obligations and some factors you may wish to consider in your response.

Under Universal Service obligations set by Ofcom, BT must provide public call boxes in order to meet the reasonable needs of end-users in terms of geographical coverage, the number of public call boxes and the quality of call box services.

A public call box is a public pay telephone which is permanently installed on public land and to which the public has access at all times. This definition excludes many public pay telephones in locations such as stations.

If BT proposes to remove the last public call box at a site, it must notify the relevant local authority, and it cannot remove the box if the local authority objects in writing within 90 days (the 'local veto'). A site is defined as any area within a walking distance of 400 metres from that public call box. This means that a box could be nearer than 400 metres away as the crow flies, but not easily accessible because of an obstacle such as a railway line.

The process for removal of such public call boxes is set out in a Direction and Guidance published by Ofcom. We are writing to draw your attention to the Direction and Guidance and to respond to some questions that have been raised with us.

Why does BT seek to remove some public call boxes?

Public call box use has been in heavy decline, and 20% of public call boxes have not been used to make a call in the last twelve months. Mobile take-up and coverage are both high - 94% of adults personally use a mobile phone and 98% of premises have 3G/4G coverage. Mobile 'roaming' for emergency calls has been in place since 2009, meaning that where a caller has no signal from their provider, a 999 call will be switched automatically to another provider's network if there is one available.
